

## HISTORY OF THE I.B.E.W. TOURNAMENT

What is now known as the I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament originated in St. Louis, Missouri, in January 1945 when the late International President, E.J. Brown, who happened to be in St. Louis, learned that the St. Louis Contractor Association was sponsoring a 12-team league made up of members of Local Union No. 1. President Brown, aware of the fact that the Milwaukee Contractors Association was also sponsoring a league, suggested a match between the two cities.

Arrangements were made that matched the three top teams of each city in a three-game match. Each team bowled at home and scores were relayed by telephone.

The St. Louis team won and became the temporary holders of a beautiful trophy donated by President Brown. This trophy must be won by a city three times before it can retain permanent possession.

### **Milwaukee, WI-Second, 1946**

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Tournament took place in Milwaukee, April 13-14, 1946. Entries from other cities swelled the number of teams to 47. It was a great success and it was decided that this event should be held annually.

The St. Louis team won the 5-man event with a score of 3097 giving them two legs on the International trophy.

### **Detroit, MI-Third, 1947**

The late President Tracy threw the first ball opening the third tournament which was held in Detroit, sponsored by Local No. 58. Sixty-eight teams fired away, and, when the scores were added up, the OHMS team of Local

No. 58, Detroit, was declared the winners with a score of 3111.

A gay party was held at the Detroit Hotel for more than 600 bowlers, visitors, and guests.

### **St. Louis, MO-Fourth, 1948**

The 4<sup>th</sup> Tournament was back in St. Louis where it began. This time 69 5-man teams were treated to a fine banquet and show at the Hotel Statler.

When the dust had settled on the lanes, Team No. 2 of Local No. 134, Oakland, IL, was far out in front with a score of 3310 which is still the highest score to be recorded in the 29 years the tournament has existed.

If memory serves me right, Vice-President F.W. Jacobs fired the first ball at a red-ribbon head pin. The results of that shot I cannot recall.

### **Chicago, IL-Fifth, 1949**

The late International President, J. Scott Milne, who was the International Secretary at the time, opened the 5<sup>th</sup> Tournament with a perfect strike.

Local No. 134 also scored with the bowlers and their wives by having a gala affair which was outstanding. This affair was held at the LaSalle Hotel.

A Chicago team, Team No. 4 of Local 371, won first place honors with a score of 2961.

A fine trophy, donated by Local No. 58, Detroit, was presented to the winners.

### **Cleveland, OH-Sixth, 1950**

On March 3<sup>rd</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup>, Cleveland was Host City. Local No. 38 was the Host Local to the largest number of

bowlers yet with 208 5-man teams entered.

President Gordon M. Freeman, who was then Vice President of the 14<sup>th</sup> District, rolled the opening ball; results unknown.

The hospitality extended to the bowlers was fantastic with a wonderful banquet and show.

Top prize money for the 5-man events went to Local Union No. 723 of Fort Wayne, IN. They toppled 3228 pins to win.

### **Miami, FL-Seventh, 1951**

The 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament was held in the fair city of Miami. Vice President G.X. Barker rolled the first ball for a perfect strike, which was followed by many more before this event was over.

Detroit Local No. 58 Electronics Team No. 1 was the winner with a score of 3117.

Brother I. Malley of Local No. 134 in Oaklawn, IL, shot the highest single score, 749, which is tops for the tournament.

### **Louisville, KY-Eighth, 1952**

Louisville was Host to the 8<sup>th</sup> Tournament and President Jimmy Brown extended the official welcome to the bowlers.

140 teams clashed for honors, and with International President Gordon Freeman, and then Vice President, leading the way with a ten-pin strike, the tournament was officially on.

Local Union No. 8 of Toledo, OH, won the 5-man event with a score of 2993.

### **Indianapolis, IN-Ninth, 1953**

163 teams from 31 Local Unions were welcomed to Indianapolis for the 9<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament.

Buffet, luncheon, refreshments, and dancing were part of the festivities which were extended to the bowlers and guests at the Claypool Hotel.

Local No. 39 of Cleveland was the lucky five who won team honors with a score of 3042.

### **Kansas City, MO-Tenth, 1954**

Kansas City Local No. 124 played host for the 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament. About 117 teams entered in the competition with one of the home teams leading the way with a total of 3005 pins toppled.

The lady guests were treated to some very fine entertainment while the bowlers toiled away at picking spares.

All present enjoyed a fine dinner and show on Saturday night plus plenty of refreshments.

### **Cincinnati, OH-Eleventh, 1955**

Ohio's "Queen City," Cincinnati, was the home of the 11<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament. The Electronics team of Local No. 58 bested all comers in the 5-man event.

Bowlers and their guests enjoyed themselves during the 2-day stay in this fair city and had the added thrill of wagering a little on the Derby which was fun in nearby Louisville.

C. Stoner and C. Miller, Local No. 202 of Rochester, N.Y., took the doubles event crown with 1477, the highest total for this event. F. Collins of Local No. 697 gave everyone a thrill by firing 11 consecutive strikes for a 297 single game, which is still a record.

### **Toledo, OH-Twelfth, 1956**

On May 5 and 6, Toledo was invaded by 234 5-man teams, the largest group thus far. Local No. 8 is to be congratulated for this very successful tournament.

Krzsak Recreation of Local No. 38 in Cleveland won the team event with 3158. A. Cioffi of Local No. 38 won the singles with 761. This was the highest for this event until 1986 and became the first bowler to win two events when he totaled 2030 for All Events, which is also high.

### **Des Moines, IA-Thirteenth, 1957**

Des Moines, the most western city to favor us thus far as the home city, welcomed bowlers from all parts of the country for the 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament.

184 teams came out west and when the shooting was over, the 5 men of Local No. 347 of the host city took the loot with a fine score of 3000. They also were awarded the traveling trophy presented by President Gordon F. Teeman and Secretary Joseph Keenan last year.

### **Detroit, MI-Fourteenth, 1958**

Locals No 17 and 58 of Detroit co-sponsored the 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament and 272 teams traveled to the Motor City, the largest group thus far. These Locals deserve a lot of credit as they accepted the huge job with less than a year to prepare themselves for this Tournament.

The 3151 points wobbled over by the Kenmore Atlantic Service team of Local No. 201, Beaver Falls, PA, was the best score for the team event.

### **Fort Wayne, IN-Fifteenth, 1959**

The 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament at Fort Wayne was again an outstanding one. A 5-man team traveled all the way from Hawaii to participate in this competition.

The bowlers and their wives enjoyed an excellent banquet followed by a fine show.

The Motors Team from Local No. 38 of Cleveland won the team championship trophy.

Another first in the history of the tournament occurred when E. Weissflug of St. Louis and Leo Carr, Sr., of Chicago both rolled a 710 series in the singles event.

### **Milwaukee, WI-Sixteenth, 1960**

Local No. 494 should be given a lot of credit for this Tournament as all the Keglers and wives had a wonderful time with tours, luncheon and style show for the ladies, a fine banquet and entertainment for all.

Again, the number of teams, 274 entered, made this the largest group in the history of the tournament to date.

Once more, a Local No. 39 team, Storer Recreation #2, captured top honors thereby retiring the championship trophy as this was the third win for Cleveland.

R.G. Peterson of Local No. 349 won the All Events trophy with a record-breaking 2063.

### **Chicago, IL-Seventeenth, 1961**

The 17<sup>th</sup> Tournament was held in Chicago sponsored by Local No. 697 of Hammond, IN, with 284 teams entered.

This was the largest tournament in the history of the event.

Local No. 697 went all out and made this a very wonderful trip, which the bowlers and their wives will all long remember.

International President Gordon Freeman and Secretary Joseph Keenan presented another trophy, which Local No. 38 of Cleveland took home with a score of 3118 for the 5-man event.

### **Jacksonville, FL-Eighteenth, 1962**

The 18<sup>th</sup> Tournament was held in Jacksonville with Local No. 177 being the host and also celebrating their 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.

Everyone who made this trip remarked about the wonderful time they had and only wish that they would have had more time to stay and enjoy the Florida sunshine.

The "Championship Trophy" donated by International President Gordon Freeman and Secretary Joseph Keenan moved to a new city as M.J. Kennedy's #2 team of Local No. 134. Chicago rolled a 3059 scratch and with a handicap of 147 pins totaled 3206 for the first place.

### **St. Louis, MO-Nineteenth, 1963**

The 19<sup>th</sup> Tournament was held in St. Louis. Local No. 1 was the host; they celebrated the dedication of their beautiful new union building. Everyone enjoyed the fine hospitality shown them during the three days in St. Louis. This year the championship trophy moved to Springfield, IL.

### **Pittsburgh, PA-Twentieth, 1964**

The 20<sup>th</sup> Tournament was held in Pittsburgh where Local No. 201, Beaver, PA, and Local No. 142 in Pittsburgh, were co-hosts.

178 teams gathered at Pittsburgh where Team No. 5 of Local No. 134, Oaklawn, IL, had a pin fall of 3148 to capture first place.

### **Jacksonville, FL-Twenty-first, 1965**

The 21<sup>st</sup> Tournament was again held in Jacksonville on May 21-23, 1965, with Local No. 177 as host. A Florida team took the honors, with 3118 being rolled by the Gabrio Electric Team of Local No. 308, Largo, FL. Singles event went to A. Cheves of Local No. 915 in Tampa with a rousing 730, and doubles to L. Byory and B. Heath of Baltimore, MD, of Local No. 24 on a 1355 series. Eric Clee took all events trophy with a total of 2019.

### **Phoenix, AZ-Twenty-second, 1966**

The 22<sup>nd</sup> Tournament was held in Phoenix, May 20-22, 1966, with Local No. 640 as host and with 73 teams entered. This was the first most westward city to host the Tournament and in the beautiful Valley of the Sun, where East meets West.

The championship trophy, donated by International President Gordon Freeman, traveled to Milwaukee's Local No. 494 Parkway Recreation with a pin fall of 3056 Singles, Local No. 38, Cleveland, Joe Swisher 719, Doubles, Local No. 58, Detroit, Vic Rizzo and Tim O'Connell 1314. All events, Local No. 640, Phoenix, Charles A Porter 1991.

### **Louisville, KY-Twenty-third, 1967**

The 23<sup>rd</sup> Tournament was held in Louisville, May 26-28, 1967, with Local 369 to host the 125 teams.

The tempo of the tournament was high and could be matched only by the Derby itself as Local No. 204 Beaver Falls, topped Local No. 357, Las Vegas, by only 4 pins with 3083. Ralph Irwin and Richard Bailey, Local No. 648, topped doubles with a 1352, as Glen Cuse, Local No. 306, took singles with 709. All events were a tie by Jack Engleton, Local No. 648, and Ray Yates, Local No. 369, each came in with a 1934.

### **Las Vegas, NV-Twenty-fourth, 1968**

Local No. 357 upheld the tradition of having another fine tournament this year with 126 teams entered.

Team honors went to Team No. 5, Local No. 369 in Louisville with a 3111 score but the host Local came close with 3100. Harold Turkey, Local No. 640, Phoenix struck it rich with a rousing 728 in Singles. Doubles victors were Earl Brass and Ed Posna from Cleveland Local No. 38, with 1377 and Bob Davison of Local No. 349 in Miami bowled them over with a nice 1990 in All Events.

### **Lansing, MI-Twenty-fifth, 1969**

Local No. 665 was the host for the Silver Anniversary Tournament with 202 teams entered. Lansing is the smallest Local with only 250 members to host the Tournament.

Detroit Local No. 58 retired another International trophy when Southeastern Electric Company won the handicap team event with 3140.

First place singles was won by Doug Vogt, Local No. 58, Detroit, with a rousing 734. Doubles champions were Bob Snethen and Lyman Han, from Miami Local No. 349 with 1383. Joseph Bianco, Local No. 252, Ann Arbor, captured All Events with 1983.

Arthur Ostrow of Local No. 58 in Detroit won a special trophy for high game of the tournament with a nifty 266. Special A.B.C. awards were presented to Roger Ankley, Local No. 150 Waukegan, IL, for picking up the 4-6-7-10 split; Bruce Winchell, Local No. 557, Saginaw, MI, for a 148 triplicate; Arthur Ostrow, Local No. 58, Detroit, and Jim Christner, Local No. 712, New Brighton, PA for 100 pins over average one game; and to Ron Morrison, Local No. 1., St. Louis, for a beautiful 702 actual series.

Local No. 665, Lansing, donated a 51" Silver Anniversary Trophy for high actual team score in the Tournament and was won by Local No. 353 in Lansing, the first year with a score of 286. The silver Anniversary trophy may be retained one year by each team winning it, but it cannot be retired and will travel to each Tournament throughout the years.

### **Santa Ana, CA-Twenty-sixth, 1970**

The 116 teams participated in the first I.B.E.W. tournament to be held on the West Coast. Hospitality and programmed events handled by Local No. 441 were excellent, and it goes without saying the setting was in the home of fun, which was Disneyland.

Highlights of this event were a trophy presented to Brother Harry Langing, 82, retired member of Local No. 1, St. Louis, who has attended 26 tournaments and is still bowling. Another special trophy was presented to

Local No. 3, New York City, for having traveled the most distance to a tournament, along with just nosed out Local No. 349 in Miami.

Another highlight was the International Office donating a new trophy since Local No. 58, Detroit, and retained possession of the past trophy by virtue of having won three times the team event.

Team honors went to Local No. 665, Lansing, with pin fall of 3074. Local No. 357, Las Vegas, won high scratch series with a pin fall of 2846. Local No. 349, Miami, who ran second best on distance to the tournament and on Team event came through in flying colors on the following: Brother Bill Langer III, won the Singles event with a total of 708 pins, Harry DeBaby and Robert Davison won the Doubles event with a total of 1360 pins, and Brother Harry DeBaby won the coveted All Events with a total of 1971 pins.

### **Miami, FL-Twenty-seventh, 1971**

After two decades, the I.B.E.W. Annual Bowling Tournament returned to Miami thereby giving Local Union No. 349 a second chance to host the tournament, and a first opportunity to show off their newly remodeled union hall on hospitality night. Even the land-lubbers enjoyed the boat ride to the banquet, which was followed by a water ski show.

Unfortunately, this tournament was scheduled during a recession period on the country, but none of the grandeur was taken away as 101 teams participated.

A special trophy was given to Team No. 1 of Local 201, Beaver, for their high actual score of 2665. Local No. 441, Anaheim, CA, furthest distance

team, Diversified Electric, walked away with the International Office's Pillard-Keenan Trophy, as well as the 27<sup>th</sup> Tournament Trophy for their high handicap score of 3076. Second place handicap team trophy was shared by Local No. 201 Team No. 1 in Beaver and hosting Local No. 349's Interstate Electric Team, both with a score of 3013. First place Singles score, 697, was bowled by Local No. 824's Bob Cash. First place All Events was won by Stan Lewis of Local No. 441 with a score of 1974. Father and son team of Robert Mitchell, Sr., and Jr., won the first place Doubles event with a score of 1323 from Local No. 56.

### **Cleveland, OH-Twenty-eighth, 1972**

Cleveland, Ohio – “The Best Location in the Nation” was the host city for the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament. 193 teams entered the Tournament.

Our Business Manager, Richard D. Acton, threw out the first ball at both lanes to start the Bowling Tournament.

Credit Union West captured top honors, thereby retiring the I.O.'s Charles Pillard-Joseph Keenan Trophy, as this was the third win of Local No. 38, Cleveland, (1959-1961-1972), with 3163.

Singles, Local No. 134 in Chicago, Bernie Connors, 702; Doubles, Local No. 3, New York Bob Gauer and Arnie Lipshetz 1355: All Events, Local No. 349 in Miami, Herman Nottbohn with 1979.

The Traveling Silver Anniversary Trophy for high actual team score was won by Team #1, 2765, Local No. 134, Chicago.

Another first in the history of the Tournament occurred with Local No.

353, Toronto, Ont., Canada, sent two teams to participate in the Tournament. Cliff Steane of Local No. 353 was presented a trophy of Goodwill by our President, J. Gilbert Steele, and Don Azzolina, the Tournament Chairman at the banquet. A good time was had by all.

### **Kansas City, MO-Twenty-ninth, 1973**

After a 19-year absence, the Annual I.B.E.W. Tournament returned to the "Heart of America," Kansas City, Missouri. Local No. 124, under the leadership of Chairman Han Brunke and Ken Troutwine, did an outstanding job in making sure everyone attending had an enjoyable time. 162 teams, from 15 states, participated in the 19<sup>th</sup> Annual Tournament.

The Traveling Silver Anniversary Trophy for high actual team score went to Harmony Club of Local No. 134 in Chicago with 2722.

Astor Electric, Local No. 349 in Miami, captured the Team title with 3072. Top man in the All Events was Craig Durham, Local No. 349, Miami with 1978. The Singles champion was Norman Hurst, Local No. 369, Louisville, with a score of 707. Henry Heacock and Ben Marks, Local NO. 349, Miami, combined for 1377 pins to take the Doubles event.

High game scratch went to Duane Dunn, Local No. 51, Springfield with 278 and Ron Krumme, Local No. 212, Cincinnati, took scratch high series with 670.

### **Louis, KY-Thirtieth, 1974**

Louisville was the scene of the 30<sup>th</sup> Annual I.B.E.W. Tournament held on July 14-16 with 183 teams.

Local No. 349 in Miami again topped the handicap teams to win the Championship, the second year in a row with 3134. Louisville was the runner-up. The Silver Anniversary trophy from Lansing for high actual team score was won by Patterson, NJ, Local No. 102 with a 2662.

Singles Champion was Pete Grande of New York, Local No. 3 with a nice 707. Doubles victors were Jim Worley and Joe Tobin from Cleveland Local No. 38, scoring 1361. All Events trophy winner was Tom Olender of Toledo Local No. 8, with a very nice 2008 total. Winners of Special Trophies were Walt Faulner, Local No. 51, Springfield, for high actual game of 2667, and Wiley Hulett, Local No. 1, St. Louis, for high actual series of 657.

### **Lansing, MI-Thirty-first, 1975**

Lansing again the host of the 31<sup>st</sup> Annual I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament was held May 30 through June 1 with 175 teams.

Miami's Local No. 349 won team honors with the third straight time with a 3134 to retire the President's Trophy. Canton, Ohio, Local No. 540 was second, only one pin behind with a 3133.

Singles Champion was Don O'Shea of Local No. 1, St. Louis, with a fine 704. Doubles honors went to Ivan Erikson of Local No. 8i76, Kokomo, IN, and Bob Holland of Local No. 58, Detroit, with a 1330. All Events Champion Dave Luotonen rolled a fantastic 2015 and 655 actual to take that award. Other special awards went to Lansing for high team actual with 2886 and Mike St. Charles of Local No. 58, Detroit, with a fine 275.

### **Washington, DC.-Thirty-second, 1976**

The Bicentennial year of the United States of America 1976 will be remembered by all I.B.E.W. members who competed in the 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Bowling Tournament. The visit to our National Capital was a review of Our American History from 1776 to 1976 – 200 Years of American Freedom to all.

Washington, D.C. Local No. 26 hosted all of the visitors in true American style. The competition for bowling was headed by “Ollies Follies” five-man leaders Local No. 26 Washington, D.C., with a total of 3095; second place Local No. 212 Team 4 in Cincinnati, total 3085. Singles event was captured by Bob Whiteman. Holland, OH, scored 724. Doubles event winners Laidlaw and Hall of Ypsilanti, MI, with 1357. All Events was topped by champion Ray McCarthy, Chicago, 1928 Total. High individual game 254 scratch went to Bill Stewart in Dayton.

### **Buffalo, NY-Thirty-third 1977**

Local No. 41, Buffalo, hosted the 33<sup>rd</sup> Annual bowling Tournament on June 3-5.

Honors for the Team event went to Team 9 of Buffalo with a score of 3075. This same team also won the actual team trophy. Buffalo teams 5 and 7 placed 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> respectively in the team event.

The Singles event was captured by G. Weber of Louisville with a 700 score. Doubles honors went to H. Hoffman and T. Kreczo of Cleveland with a score of 1293. The All Events crown went to William Langer, Jr. of Miami with a combined score of 1964, which included the high actual series of

the Tournament, a fine 670. The high actual Single game trophy was awarded to P. Berrier of Harrisburg for a 244 game.

### **Dayton, OH-Thirty-fourth, 1978**

Local No. 825, Dayton, hosted the Annual I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament on June 9-11.

Allied Union Club of New York Local No. 3 bested some 150 other teams with a score of 693. The Doubles winners were Jack Jaiger and Wil Brennan of Chicago Local No. 134 with the score of 1340. Tom Sigurdson of Toledo Local Union No. 8 headed the All Events.

### **Harrisburg, PH-Thirty-fifth, 1979**

Local Union No. 143, Harrisburg, was proud to have hosted the 35<sup>th</sup> Annual I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament on June 15-17.

The team from Local No. 307, Cumberland, MD, distinguished themselves by taking first place in the Team event with a score of 3116.

The Doubles winners were Brothers Lou Moyer and Henry Becker from Local No. 26, Washington, D.C., with a score of 1357. The Singles honor went to Brother Bush from Local No. 38, Cleveland, with a score of 719. Top honors in All Events went to Brother Lou Moyer from Local No. 26, Washington, D.C. 2 with a score of 1980.

### **St. Louis, MO-Thirty-sixth, 1980**

The 36<sup>th</sup> Tournament was held in St. Louis. Local No. 1 was the host for the first time in over a decade.

Everyone that made this trip remarked about the wonderful time that

they had and how kind and generous the Anheuser-Busch Company was to Local No. 1 and the 36<sup>th</sup> tournament. Honors for the Team event went to Teel Lighting from Local No. 1 with a score of 3129.

Singles Champion was Irv Blaszyński of Local No. 134 from Chicago with a nice 739. Doubles victors were Newbold and Radloff from Detroit Local No. 58, scoring 1429. The All Events trophy winner was Earl Balse of St. Louis Local No. 1 with a very nice 2028.

### **Miami, FL-Thirty-seventh, 1981**

After a decade, the I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament returned to Miami. In a recession year a small but spirited group of 70 teams made their way south, to enjoy the hospitality of Local No. 349 and to bask in our Florida sunshine.

The highlights of the weekend were a beer bash at poolside and a stunning Hawaiian review at our dinner dance, both of which took place at the world famous Fountainbleu Hotel.

Don Carter, All Star bowler of yesteryear, threw out the first ball at this beautiful Kendale Lanes.

Team honors went to Eagle Brand Snacks of Local No. 1 in St. Louis. The Singles title went to John Morris, Local No. 212, from Cincinnati, with 726. The Doubles event went to Ken Hunt, our International tournament Director, and Jerry Ward, Local No. 26, of Washington, D.C. with 1366. Larry Oyer, Local No. 88, from Chillicothe captures All Events with 1969. A good time was had by all!

### **Cleveland, OH,-Thirty-eight, 1982**

The 38<sup>th</sup> I.B.E.W. Bowling Tournament was held in Las Vegas, Nevada, June 18-20.

Cleveland Local No. 38 was the host for the third time since the start of the tournaments. Donald Azzolina was the tournament Chairman for the second time.

Since Las Vegas Local No. 357 did not have a bowling league, Don asked for permission from Local No. 1 357 President Albert Cecil Wynn, Jr., who in turn presented it to the Executive Board and cleared the way for Local No. 38 to have the Tournament held there. It was also noted at the Captain's meeting at the St. Louis Tournament, June 1980.

There were 106 teams that entered the Tournament and we called this very successful since our country had been in a deep recession. Local No. 357 business manager, Rory R. Smith, threw out the first ball at the Showboat Lanes to start the tournament.
